PASS Quickstart Guide for Faculty

The <u>Promoting At-promise Student Success</u> (<u>PASS</u>) project is a longitudinal, large scale research-practice partnership that has been underway for ten years. Our research provides insights into how to shift campus culture to improve sense of belonging, mattering, well-being, and major and career confidence for at-promise students through a research-based approach called ecological validation. Importantly, PASS research underlines the critical value of faculty in bolstering the success of at-promise students.
